Community Grants 2025

This year the Parish Council is delighted to have been able to grant fund £8660 to 14 community groups and organisations across the Parish with further applications still being considered. Every January Council invite applications from Shenstone, Stonnall & Little Aston with many groups benefitting including children's uniformed groups in two wards. Grants this year include funds towards new curtains for Stonnall Village Hall, a recycled bench to replace an old metal one on Stonnall Playing Fields & Stonnall Community Centre, who plan to purchase an advanced hearing loop. In Little Aston, the Tennis Club are purchasing some much-needed maintenance equipment. In Shenstone, Friends of Shenstone Station are replenishing plant stocks for the platform baskets & tubs, Friday

Friends have received their usual contribution towards the cost of their transport for members of the Friday lunch club and the Senior Brunch Club have purchased a dishwasher to not only benefit their group but all users of Trinity Hall, who were also successful in securing grant funding for a new gate. These are just some of those benefitting from this year's grants with others still pending a decision as Council are waiting on more information from some of the applications. These will be decided at a future full council meeting. All of our grants benefit our local community across all ages. If you would like to apply for a grant for your group, applications are welcome every December/January and allocated in February/March.

Draft revised Neighbourhood Plans for Shenstone, Stonnall and Little Aston Completed

After many months of Working Group and Steering Group preparation working with village residents, three draft revised Neighbourhood Plans are now complete. The draft plans are all now at various stages of scrutiny by residents and statutory agencies including Lichfield District Council. The District Council may appoint an Independent Examiner if any of the proposed Neighbourhood Plan revisions are considered significant in planning terms.

The Parish Council is to support the development of the revised Neighbourhood Plan priorities and projects once approved. It will do this by dividing over £100k of funding

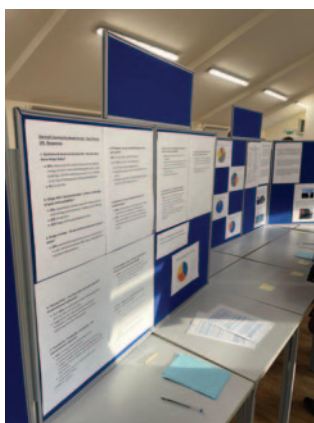
between each village. This will allow the community supported projects in the draft plans such as new village amenity provision, traffic calming measures or environmental improvements to be further developed.

The three Neighbourhood Plans have been very important in protecting and enhancing the quality of our rural neighbourhoods to date. The updated, revised Neighbourhood Plans will ensure they continue in that role. Please see below for very important updates on the Stonnall Plan which require Stonnall residents participation & input please.

STONNALL NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

For the last 12 months or so, a large group of Stonnall Residents have worked together with our local Councillors and a Specialist Consultant, authorised by The Parish Council, to refresh Stonnall's current Neighbourhood Plan. This was originally adopted in April 2016 following a Village Referendum.

Foottherley Rough Woodland Bluebell Open Weekend



By kind permission of the owner, Mr Williams, this delightful conserved woodland, carpeted with splendid bluebells is to be open to visitors on Saturday 26th and Sunday 27th April 2025.

Access is between 10.00am and 12.00 mid day and 2pm and 4.00pm on both days. The access point is located on the eastern boundary of the woodland, facing the large open field with a broad bean crop. The loop path from the Lynne Lane industrial estate to Holly Hill Lane takes you past the access point. The local gamekeeper will be on hand to assist with access.

36 BUS UPDATE

Many of our residents of Stonnall and Shenstone will be aware of an hourly Number 36 bus service provided by Chase Rider on both weekdays and Saturdays. This service connects the villages and allows onward travel to both Walsall via Aldridge and to Lichfield (some services via Wall) in the opposite direction.

Recently the bus company have increased the service for the time being to include Sunday travel. As this service is new, residents may not be aware of the availability.

Weekdays starts at 7.21 at Stonnall at The Royal Oak and 7.28 at Shenstone at Holm View Close.

Saturdays starts at 9.29 at Stonnall and 9.36 at Shenstone.

Sundays starts at 9.35 at Stonnall and 9.36 at Shenstone.

Walsall Service

Weekdays starts at 8.08 at Shenstone at Holm View Close and 8.15 at Stonnall at The Royal Oak.

Saturdays starts at 9.18 at Shenstone and 9.25 at Stonnall.

Sundays starts at 10.21 at Shenstone and 10.25am at Stonnall.

Shenstone Playing Fields Management Committee



The Playing Fields Committee Management Committee has received directions from the Charity Commission and also separate legal advice that allow preparation for an Annual General Meeting. The management committee can only proceed to an AGM on the basis of a former 1988 constitution. That preparation is now underway and it is hoped an AGM can be held in June or July.

The current management committee has appointed specialist consultants to conclude negotiations on the continuation of the Shenstone Country Club lease. The management committee has received an annual independent safety inspection of all existing play and exercise equipment and is to spend over £3.000 on parts replacement and repair.

The main and small football pitches continue to be intensively used by all ages and levels of player. The management committee is finalising negotiations with a local contractor to enhance the cutting, fertilising, seeding, watering and aeration of the grass.

A five-mile leg stretch around Fotherley

Follow Fotherley Lane, past the Hollyhill Lane turn, to where the road turns 90 degrees towards Stonnall. Here take the footpath to the right through the trees and then keep left on the path alongside the trees and then right alongside the brook. Take the second bridge (narrow) across the stream and follow the path through the trading estate to Lynn Lane. (6)

Turn Right into the village and then turn right up Main Street. After the Fox and Hounds, turn right and then take the metalled path on the left leading back up to the Church. (1)

Back lane is very good for picking blackberries but it is also prone to rampant growth of brambles and depends on the efforts of the Staffordshire Ranger, with Sutton Coldfield Ramblers, to maintain access. The picture, below, shows the working party pausing to take breath after battling their way through Back Lane. Although the moors of Fotherley may be less impressive than those of the Pennines, Devon or North Yorkshire, when combined with Back Lane, they are certain to provide a pleasant excursion for a summer day, or a crisp, frosty winter morning.

This circular walk is flat with a mixture of field paths and quiet lanes. There are just 2 stiles and they are both stable and well maintained. The numbers in brackets (eg (1)) correspond to the stage numbers shown on the map below. The route is 8 kilometres (5 miles) long, so if you allow two and a half hours and start at 9.00 am, then you will be able to reward yourselves, with a coffee and cake at the Library afterwards.

Starting, from St Johns church (1) the route heads westwards down Holly Hill Road and over the railway bridge before turning left into the field, along the footpath towards Fotherley. (2)

When Fotherley Lane is reached, turn left as far as the junction with Moor Lane. Take the right turn to follow Moor Lane to the end of the metalled road. (3)

Turn left along the tree-lined Back Lane. After half a mile, turn right at the end of the track down the slope. (4)

Follow the footpath northwest, and as it bends round to the right, you will meet the end of Moor Lane. (3)

Enter the field on the left, between the concrete column and the gatepost. Take the footpath to the right of the new fence, northwards. In half a mile, cross the stile, and head left to the stream to cross the footbridge. Don't forget to wave to the alpacas on your right, as you rejoin Fotherley Lane and turn left. (5)

The Shenstone Against Speeding group is dedicated to reducing the speed on Birmingham Road and within the general Shenstone village area.

There have been several fatalities and serious accidents on Birmingham Road since 2011. The road is a major through route from Birmingham & Sutton Coldfield to Walsall, Lichfield, Tamworth and Burton-on-Trent. There has been a significant increase in volume of traffic and the speed of those users is a major cause of concern for the residents.

Shenstone is home to Greysbrooke Primary School and many parents have to walk their children on a very narrow pavement with cars and HGV vehicles thundering past just feet from them.

The Group is actively lobbying the Parish Council, Lichfield Council, Staffordshire County Council, the Police and Sarah Edwards MP to provide enhanced speed deterrent features in and around Shenstone. Its suggestions include:

1. An average speed camera set from the Court Drive junction to the turning for the Dobbies Garden Centre.
2. A speed camera installed prior to the junction of Park Lane and Birmingham Road.
3. The removal of the pavement on the field side of Birmingham Road and a significant widening of the pavement on the residential side of Birmingham Road.

Update on the Additional Room Project at the Little Aston Village Hall



Towards the end of November 2024, a total of £216,000 had been secured, of which £100,000 had been accumulated towards the project within the Village Hall's own funds. The remainder was a combination of grants already received and a promised grant of £30,000 from the Enovert Community Trust (ECT) and a promised grant of £39,000 from the Platinum Jubilee Village Halls Fund (PJF).

These promised grants had a condition requiring the promised funds to be drawn down before 31st March 2025 against invoices for completed construction work or the promised money would be withdrawn. ECT were prepared to allow a little grace, but PJF stated that they could not as the funds were coming from the Government. This meant that the work needed to start no later than the end of January 2025.

However, we were still short of sufficient funds, so further cost savings were identified. Also, ahead of their expected decision date, the Garfield Weston Foundation gave us a grant of £5,000. The re-quote plus this £5,000 meant that we had sufficient funds to complete the construction but with the proposed air source heat pump and the acoustic attenuation coating for the ceilings as a follow-on project. This allowed us to apply to the Lichfield Diocesan Trust, (our Landlord) for Landlord Permission and this permission was granted on 16th December.

Over the Christmas break a contract was prepared for signature and a draft programme was submitted suggesting a start date of 10th January. However, the contractor decided he needed to review his quotation and submitted a revised quotation on 22nd January. This quotation was almost 15% higher but still just within the available funds. Then, on 30th January, the contractor sent an email saying he could not carry out the work for the re-quoted price. We asked for a breakdown of his costings which he submitted on 10th February. The price was now a further 40% higher.

In the meanwhile, we had approached other contractors and one, Build and Construct Ltd (BAC) provided a quotation for £285,000 for the whole project inclusive of the air source heat pump and the acoustic attenuation coating. We explained that we only had £218,000

available and that it was essential that once the main structure was built, secure and watertight, the refurbishment of the committee room had to be completed and the room back in use before any of the new areas were completed. Also, work within the new areas would have to stop when the available funds ran out.

We also explained that four other grant application had been made and that these should all be decided before the end of April. BAC agreed to this and provided a revised quotation of £226,680 to complete the main construction; to complete all the external works; to complete the committee room and the other work affected areas; to complete all the new areas up to and including the first fix for all the electrical and plumbing items; and to complete all the insulation and plaster boarding but not the plaster skim. This price did not include the acoustic attenuation coating or the air source heat pump. BAC also agreed to work as far as the available funds would allow.

Based on this quotation and the associated assurances regarding the financial limitations, the Management Committee agreed that the work should go ahead.

The contract was finalised and signed on 17th February and the work started immediately. Hopefully, the refurbished committee room will be back in use before the end of May.

If sufficient of the remaining grant applications are successful, the additional room should be in use before the end of July.

*A full programme will be available prior to the day... so watch out for social media reminders and posters.

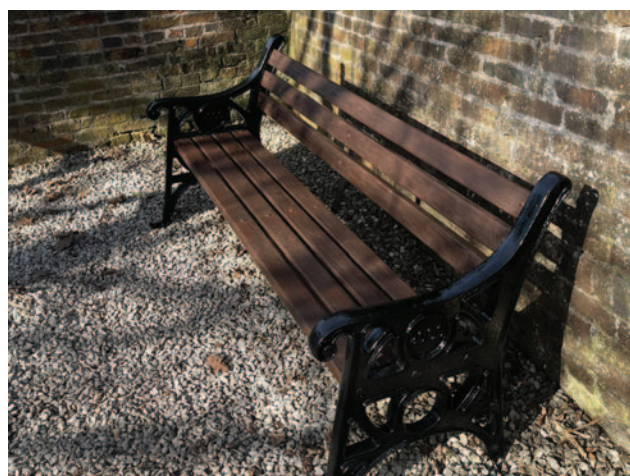

Chester Road Campaign

Successful Result – and a major milestone achieved!

SCARs campaign to make the junctions of Birch Lane/ Gravelly Lane and Lazy Hill safer have made significant strides forward. Walsall councillors attended a SCAR meeting on the 8th January in Stonnall to confirm plans were now approved and they were entering the statutory 21 days public consultation period (due to close 31/01/25).

The consultation period is now closed with no objections and work has already started updating the signage! The speed limit along the Chester Road, from the quarry to the flooring company will be reduced from **50mph** to **40mph**, improvements will be made to the **Central hatching**, additional **Gateways**, **VAS's** (x2) and **45** improved road signs will be introduced along the section of road to warn of the dangers.

This is a major milestone for the village in getting Walsall Council to come to a neighbouring councils district and help make improvements for the safety of our residents. It just demonstrates what can be achieved when a community comes together.

Contacting Highways

As part of the Highways Transformation Programme, Staffordshire County Council Highways have developed a new customer Highways portal to replace the current 'Report It'.

The new portal has taken a year to develop and is the result of a £500,000 investment into new technology, which will make it easier for residents in Staffordshire to report issues on Staffordshire's highways.

How do I contact the Highways team, or report a problem on the highway?

The preferred and easiest way to make an enquiry or report non-urgent problems on the highway is to use either the Report It tool or MyStaffs app which is available on both Android and Apple devices. www.staffordshire.gov.uk

I don't have access to the internet, how else can I report a problem or contact the Highways team?

We would encourage you to ask your family or friends to help you use our online reporting tools.

If you do not have access to a smartphone, laptop or internet connection, many of our local libraries offer free help and advice to get you connected to our online services. Alternatively the Parish Clerk will be happy to assist you.

Potholes Overview

Staffordshire County Council prioritise all potholes so that the most dangerous ones are repaired either the next day or within 7 days.

The vast majority are given to specialist teams and will be repaired depending on location and road use, usually within 90 days however this may be extended depending on resources.

Pothole repair methods

We use numerous approaches to repair in order to ensure cost effectiveness, these include; several planer patching teams for larger natured repairs, several traditional 'cut and break' crews and two-man reactive teams for smaller natured repairs, an in-situ tarmac manufacturing team and four velocity patching machines are also deployed during the appropriate treatment season.

Road master (velocity patching)

During the summer road-repair season and in milder conditions we endeavour to repair as many defects in one location as possible. The county council has access to four road master machines and these are deployed to tackle carriageways where several road defects may be present within a given area.

Road master machines help to speed up the repair of localised road surface defects as they allow operatives to fill and seal potholes remotely without refilling throughout the day.

The machines create no waste meaning they are more environmentally friendly than traditional filling methods.

Cut and break

This involves cutting around the pothole and breaking away the fretted material, then refilling with tarmac. A bitumen over-banding may be used to help protect the joint from ingress of water and risk of associated damage. However, this is not the case in all types of repair such as more modern velocity-patcher techniques, or where the repair is a temporary make-safe repair.

Other repairs may include planer patching, hot spot patching and pre-patching for preventative maintenance treatments.

Preventative maintenance treatments

There are various surface treatment designs that form part of our preventative maintenance programme and the following descriptions explain the processes involved in each type. For further detail on how schemes are identified and prioritised please see the asset investment page on the website.

Surface dressing

Surface dressing involves the process of applying a bituminous binder topped with aggregate chippings. This effectively seals the road from the ingress of water and restores the necessary skid resistance to the surface course.

Inevitably, despite concerted sweeping operations, the process does lead to loose chippings immediately after the application, which is why 10 mph notices are erected throughout sites.

Structural maintenance treatments

These schemes involve the removal and replacement of the old material and have varying costs per square metre depending on the depth and length of surfacing needing to be removed and replaced.

As these works are extensive, each one requires a very significant proportion of investment from the highway maintenance budget.

Parish Office Opening Hours

The Parish Council currently has several very large projects underway including the revision of its Neighbourhood Plans for all 3 Wards and investigation work for a sustainable heat source all requiring uninterrupted and often off-site work.

In an effort to help the Clerk there will be some minor changes to the times that the office is directly accessible to the public.

Monday and Friday; the office will remain closed. Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday afternoons will now also be closed from 1:00pm.

Emails and telephone messages will continue to be monitored and dealt with throughout. If an in-person meeting is required during these closed times, an appointment may be made.
